A motion by Trustee Finlay to approve the Consent Calendar as amended was seconded and unanimously approved.

5. Legislative Report

District Manager Kenn Fujioka reported that the MVCAC has met several times with bill sponsor Assembly Member Rich Gordon to discuss Assembly Bill 1362. It will not be heard in committee until June as Kenn understands the focus of the bill is narrowing to just San Mateo County Mosquito and Vector Control District

Senate Bill 1246 was introduced by Janet Nguyen (34th District, Orange County) in February and it would require at least seven days advance notification to various government agencies prior to any spraying by aircraft or unmanned aerial vehicle. This bill had not been heard by any Senate committee and the MVCAC already sent letters strongly opposing it. Kenn's report listed major reasons for opposing this bill and includes our District's Cooperative Agreement with the California Department of Health Services that allows for reasonable applications of pesticides to control vectors and protect public health.

Kenn reported that he would agendize the bill for Board discussion at its next meeting.

6. District Administration

Kenn reported that the District is currently having the Administration building carpeted, offices redesigned, and new office modules installed in the Operations Building.

Six members of the District staff gave excellent presentations at the MVCAC Annual Meeting on February 28 to March 2, 2016.

Kenn has been invited to attend the South Pasadena City Council meeting on March 18, 2016. South Pasadena's Public Works Director informed Kenn that he was asked to place the topic of annexing to the District on their agenda.

7. Disease Surveillance

Scientific Program Manager Wakoli Wekesa commented that to date El Niño has diminished but we are anticipating adult *Aedes* and the risk of their associated diseases to appear soon. He reported that staff will be trapping and testing all mosquito species and the viruses associated with both *Aedes* and *Culex*.

Item 4C

Wakoli attended a number of meetings in March including the MVCAC Annual Meeting in Sacramento, VCJPA Annual Workshop in Oakland, the Vertebrate Pest Conference in Newport Beach, and the Animal Care Conference in Long Beach where typhus in Los Angeles County was a major topic.

Wakoli mentioned that LA County has the highest number of typhus cases in the State and anticipates more will be identified this year. There are some years where there have been more cases of typhus than WNv in our District.

Responding to Trustee Su's inquiry, Wakoli explained that Zika is a virus transmitted by Aedes and possibly Culex. Also, males infected with Zika can sexually transmit the virus to their partners. Last year there were thousands of cases reported in the western hemisphere. Wakoli commented that in adults it is a mild disease with the exception of those exhibiting Guillain-Barré Syndrome. It causes microcephaly in children born to infected mothers. Officials think the virus most likely will be introduced here by those traveling from infected areas.

Kenn compared infections with Zika virus to the rubella epidemic that started in Europe in the Spring of 1963 and spread to the US in 1963-1964.

Trustee Nelson shared a report regarding a family member with possible travel-related Zika virus exposure. She stated for the case of her relative the test was not performed. The Centers for Disease Control has specific criteria for which samples will be tested. She will continue to contact people to help improve the availability of commercial tests.

8. Trustee Reports

Trustee Calaycay thanked Kenn and Mel for his ride-along with Antonio and Darrin to the San Gabriel River in the Azusa Canyon where they found blackfly larvae. They visited the city of El Monte where the vector control specialists explained the underground storm drain program. He appreciated the expertise and skill of our staff and encouraged all Trustees to go on a ride-along.

Trustee Morgan reported that he attended the MVCAC's Annual meeting and commented about the training he received.

Trustee Bissner commented that he was very impressed by the District's employees' excellent presentations at the MVCAC Annual meeting.

9. New Business

No new business. He reminded Trustees that there are two committee vacancies.

10. Adjournment.

A motion by Trustee Bissner to adjourn was seconded and unanimously approved. The meeting was adjourned at 7:20 a.m.







Background

SB 1246 (Mandatory notification and waiting period for aerial application of pesticides)

At your last meeting, you directed staff to place on the agenda this month an item to consider opposing SB 1246 (Nguyen) (Attachment 1).

The Bill requires "At least seven days before administering pesticides by aircraft or unmanned aerial vehicle over a residential area, a pest control operator or pest control business shall notify affected governmental agencies, school districts, chambers of commerce or similar entities, California State Assembly Members, California State Senators, United States Congressmen, and United States Senators."

Further, SB 1246 would require agencies to notify the above agencies/individuals or face criminal charges, and contains specific requirements of a notice.

The Bill has been forwarded to the Senate's Environmental Quality Committee, and the MVCAC has already sent a letter to Senator Nguyen's office "strongly opposing" it.

Several examples of reasons for opposing SB 1246 are:

- 1. Aerial applications over residential areas are emergency measures based on risk which is derived scientifically and in real time. A seven day delay subjects the application to unpredictable environmental conditions, e.g., weather.
- 2. A seven-day delay will increase the risk of disease because the conditions that predispose infection already exist. This will be exacerbated because mosquitoes can develop from egg to adult in five days.
- 3. The delay will cause vectors and the pathogens they transmit to disburse further, increasing the area where and the amount of pesticides must be applied.

- 4. The Cooperative Agreement between the California Department of Health Services and the vector control agencies allows for reasonable applications of pesticides to control vectors and protect public health.
- 5. The California Code of Regulations exempts vector control agencies from notifying requirements but most agencies do it anyway.
- 6. Numerous studies have shown that adulticides applied from air to control mosquitoes do not adversely affect humans.
- 7. The risk of disease from an infection with West Nile virus is far greater than an adverse reaction from pesticides used to control mosquitoes.
- 8. Though not required, this District has a notification protocol for agencies and residents regarding community-based applications of pesticides, and the ultimate decision to apply pesticides by air rests with this Board, not staff.

Other bills of note:

AB 1362 (Selection of Vector Control Boards by City Selection Committees)

Although AB 1362 (Attachment 2) has been referred to the Assembly's Committee on Government and Finance and is not scheduled to be heard until June this year, we are hearing of activity through the Mosquito and Vector Control Association of California's legislative advocates. Three cities in the San Mateo County Mosquito and Vector Control District (Foster City, Brisbane, and San Bruno) so far have opposed the bill.

We are continuing to follow AB 1362 and will convey this Board's opposition when it is necessary to do so.

AB 2596 (Statewide ban of anticoagulant pesticides)

Assembly Bill 2596 (Bloom) (Attachment 3) seeks to ban statewide the use of all anticoagulants as pesticides. Anticoagulants are used in urban settings by vector control agencies to control populations of Norway and roof rats. A universal ban would hamper the programs of these agencies, and potentially lead to an increase in number of rats and risk for human disease.

The MVCAC's legislative advocates have initiated dialogue with Assembly member Bloom's staff, and at this point they are receptive. We hope that the Bill will either be amended to include a public health exemption or pulled.

An act to add Section 12978.5 to the Food and Agricultural Code, and to add Section 2056 to the Health and Safety Code, relating to pesticides.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 1246, as introduced, Nguyen. Pesticides: aerial spraying: notice from aerial pesticide sprayers and mosquito and vector control districts.

Existing law regulates the use of pesticides and the business of pest control, and requires a person who operates a pest control business to be licensed by the Director of Pesticide Regulation and registered by the county agricultural commissioner. Existing law also requires a pest control aircraft pilot to be registered with the Department of Pesticide Regulation. A violation of those provisions is a misdemeanor.

Existing law separately provides for the formation of mosquito abatement and vector control districts, and prescribes the powers, functions, and duties of those districts.

This bill would require pest control operators, pest control businesses, and mosquito abatement and vector control districts, at least 7 days before administering pesticides by aircraft or unmanned aerial vehicle over a residential area, to notify various people and entities, including, but not limited to, affected governmental agencies, school districts, and chambers of commerce. The bill would specify the information required to be included in the notice. By imposing additional duties on local governmental agencies and because a violation of the bill's provisions relating to pest control operators and pest control businesses would be a crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

SB 1246 -2-

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that with regard to certain mandates no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

With regard to any other mandates, this bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs so mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: yes.

- 19 SEC. 2. Section 2056 is added to the Health and Safety Code, 20 to read:
- 21 2056. At least seven days before administering pesticides by
- 22 aircraft or unmanned aerial vehicle over a residential area, a district
- 23 shall notify affected governmental agencies, school districts,
- 24 chambers of commerce or similar entities, California State
- 25 Assembly Members, California State Senators, United States

 - However, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that this act contains other costs mandated by the state, reimbursement to local agencies and school districts for those costs shall be made pursuant to Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1362, as amended, Gordon. Mosquito abatement and vector control districts: board of trustees: appointment of members.

Existing law, the Mosquito Abatement and Vector Control District Law, specifies the procedures for district formation, the procedures for the selection of the district board of trustees and officers, and the powers and duties of the board. Existing law authorizes the board of supervisors to appoint one person to the board of trustees, and the city council of each city that is located in whole or in part within the district to appoint one person to the board of trustees, in the case of a district that is located entirely within a single county and contains both incorporated territory and unincorporated territory.

This bill would authorize the board of supervisors and a city selection committee, established pursuant to specified provisions of law, to appoint persons to the board of trustees, as specified, in the case of a district that is located entirely within a single county and contains both incorporated territory, including every city within that county, and unincorporated territory: a city council, located in an existing or newly formed district as specified above, to adopt a resolution requesting that

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appointments of persons to the board of trustees instead be made by a city selection committee, established pursuant to specified provisions of law, and conditioned upon a majority of authorized city councils adopting their respective resolutions. This bill would authorize the city selection committee to decrease the total number of appointments to be made by the committee if a majority of city councils within the district make this request in their respective resolutions. This bill would prohibit the total number of appointments made by the committee from exceeding the number of incorporated cities that are located in whole or in part within the district, and would prohibit those appointments from affecting the appointments made by the board of supervisors.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: no. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 2021.5 is added to the Health and Safety 2 Code, to read:

2021.5. (a) A city council that is authorized to appoint one person to the board of trustees of a district, pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 2021, may adopt a resolution requesting that appointments instead be made by a city selection committee, established pursuant to Article 11 (commencing with Section 50270) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the Government Code.

- (b) This section shall only apply if a majority of city councils that are located within the district and are authorized to appoint a person to the board of trustees adopt their respective resolutions pursuant to this section. This section shall apply to existing and newly formed districts as defined in subdivision (b) of Section 2021.
- (c) The city selection committee described in subdivision (a) may decrease the total number of appointments to be made by the committee if a majority of city councils within the district make this request in their respective resolutions. The total number of appointments made by the committee shall not exceed the number of incorporated cities that are located in whole or in part within the district.

(d) The appointments made by the city selection committee shall not affect the appointments made by the board of supervisors pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 2021.

SECTION 1. Section 2021 of the Health and Safety Code is amended to read:

- 2021. Within 30 days after the effective date of the formation of a district, a board of trustees shall be appointed as follows:
- (a) In the ease of a district that contains only unincorporated territory in a single county, the board of supervisors shall appoint five persons to the board of trustees.

- (d) In the case of a district that is located in two or more counties and contains both incorporated territory and unincorporated territory, the board of supervisors of each county may appoint one person to the board of trustees, and the city council of each city that is located in whole or in part within the district may appoint one person to the board of trustees. If those appointments result in a board of trustees with less than five persons, the board of supervisors of the principal county shall appoint enough additional persons to make a board of trustees of five members.

No. 2596

Introduced by Assembly Member Bloom

February 19, 2016

An act to amend Section 12978.7 of the Food and Agricultural Code, relating to pesticides.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2596, as introduced, Bloom. Pesticides: use of anticoagulants. Existing law regulates the use of pesticides and authorizes the Director of Pesticide Regulation to adopt regulations to govern the possession, sale, or use of any pesticide, as prescribed. Existing law prohibits, except as specified, the use of any pesticide that contains one or more of specified anticoagulants in wildlife habitat areas, as defined. Existing law requires the director, and each county agricultural commissioner under the direction and supervision of the director, to enforce the provisions regulating the use of pesticides. A violation of these provisions is a misdemeanor.

This bill would expand this prohibition to include a pesticide containing additional specified anticoagulants and would also prohibit the use of a pesticide containing one of those anticoagulants in the entire state.

To the extent the bill would impose additional duties on county agricultural commissioners, and because the bill would expand the definition of a crime, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

AB 2596 -2-

This bill would provide that with regard to certain mandates no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

With regard to any other mandates, this bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs so mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: yes.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. (a) The Legislature finds and declares all of the 2 following:

- (1) Wildlife, including birds of prey, mountain lions, bobcats, fishers, foxes, coyotes, and endangered species such as the northern spotted owl, pacific fisher, and San Joaquin kit fox, are an irreplaceable part of California's natural ecosystems. As predators of small mammals, they play an important role in regulating and controlling the population of rodents throughout the state to improve public health and welfare.
- (2) Millions of people annually visit California for the purposes of viewing and photographing wildlife, and these visits contribute millions of dollars to California's economy.
- (3) Urban areas are increasingly being used by predatory mammals and birds of prey and the public enjoys seeing them and values these animals and the ecosystem services they provide.
- (4) The ecosystem services provided by native wildlife predators are a public trust, just like clean air and water. We, as California residents, are obligated to conserve these wildlife populations for future generations of Californians.
- (5) Scientific research and state studies have found rodenticides in over 75 percent of animals tested. These rodenticides lead to direct mortality and chronic long-term health impacts for natural predators, nontarget organisms, and endangered species and further steps are needed to reduce rodenticide exposure in nontarget animals.
- (6) Rodenticides can be counterproductive to rodent control by poisoning, harming, and killing natural predators that help regulate rodent populations throughout California.

Background

Each year the Board's Personnel Committee considers personnel expenses before they are forwarded to the Finance Committee to incorporate into the draft budget for the next fiscal year.

The attached spreadsheet compares the proposed personnel expenses for Fiscal Year 2017 against the budget for Fiscal Year 2016. Several issues will impact the draft budget for Fiscal Year 2016-2017.

In Fiscal Year 2016, the District budgeted for eight full-time limited term positions (three vector control specialists, two assistant vector ecologists, one office assistant, one data analyst, and one buildings and grounds maintenance worker) to address an increasing scope of work. Our work force is younger, and there are more staff who will in each of the next five years be eligible for merit increases.

The line item for non-exempt salaries (6212) shows a considerable surplus which is due to hiring employees after the beginning of the fiscal year, and a full-time staff who was on an extended leave. We will be fully staffed in Fiscal Year 2017, so this surplus will not occur again.

We are proposing an increase to the salary of the Office Manager. This increase is not a result of a survey of similar positions, but an adjustment to the salary scale of the District that is commensurate with the position's responsibilities. The increase represents a five percent increase in the incumbent's salary; the annual impact is \$4,305.

In Fiscal Year 2016 we addressed:

- 1. The increased work the District must perform regarding disease surveillance
- 2. The increased workload vector control specialists face
- 3. Balancing the uncertainty regarding how *Aedes* will expand its distribution with the current work and preparation that must be done
- 4. Reducing the number of extra-help employees while providing the best possible level of service

In Fiscal Year 2017 we would like to increase the amount of time we spend controlling mosquitoes in the underground storm drain systems. In Southern California this habitat provides year round habitat for mosquitoes infected with West Nile virus. Our District has only begun to look at our system because of the resources it takes to safely and properly conduct inspections, treatments, and surveillance. We feel that hiring two extra-help vector control technicians for three months will allow us to expand further at a reasonable cost our underground storm drain program, and help us determine our future direction.

Cost of Living Allowance

The Board considers each year a Cost of Living Allowance based on the February federal Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles-Orange-Riverside County area (attached). For February 2016 The CPI is 2.4 percent. The impact to the budget is approximately \$55,249.

Manager's Recommendation

Consider the possible scenarios regarding personnel expenses and produce a budget to forward to the Finance Committee that provides the best service to our residents
