President Bissner reported he came in third and thanked the Board for their support.

7. District Administration

Southern California West Nile Virus Task Force Meeting on April 13, 2016: Kenn reported that our staff is working with other vector control districts and public health departments in southern California to develop plans that address locally acquired cases of diseases transmitted by invasive *Aedes* and West Nile virus.

The city of Baldwin park is surveying their residents to gauge their support of annexing into our district. Staff has prepared an informational video that was shown at each of three town hall meetings. Kenn reported that he will attend the city of South Pasadena's council

meeting on June 1, 2016. Their staff has asked numerous questions about the annexation process.

Wakoli, Jason, and Kenn attended the AMCA Annual Washington Conference on May 9-11, 2016 and visited the offices of California Representatives Norma Torres, Grace Napolitano, Paul Aguilar, and Judy Chu. They discussed support for President Obama's proposal to allocate \$1.9 billion towards controlling Zika virus and removing the requirement that we have NPDES permits.

The District's Board Room be a polling site for the primary elections on Tuesday, June 7, 2016 from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm.

8. Disease Surveillance

Scientific Programs Manager Wakoli Wekesa reported that the District's biggest problem is the appearance of *Aedes albopictus* and *Ae. aegypti*. Staff will continue door-to-door surveillance and continued use of control measures to help keep mosquito population down and appraise the Board accordingly.

9. Trustee Reports

Trustee Chandler thanked Mr. Lee for attending our Board meeting.

10. New Business

President Bissner announced that the Finance Committee will meet immediately after the Board Adjourns followed by a closed session of the Personnel Committee.

11. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 7:12 am.

None of the mosquito pools collected and tested in the District were positive for WNv. In California, 27 mosquito pools from 6 counties have been WNv-positive during 2016; four were collected in Los Angeles County.

No dead birds have been found positive for WNv in the District during 2016. In California for 2016, 59 dead birds from 6 counties tested positive for WNv including six from Los Angeles County, none within the District.

VI. Aedes albopictus

Collections for the month of April are being updated from 147 to 174 positive collections of *Aedes albopictus* gathered from 1240 inspections of 814 properties. In May there were 167 positive collections from 964 properties. *Aedes albopictus* has been detected in 17 cities within the District in 2016. Both Colt foggers used for backyard adulticiding are out of order and no longer being manufactured so replacement parts are no longer available. Two bullet foggers have been modified for use against adult mosquitoes.

VII. Black Fly

Black fly larvae and adults were collected from Azusa, Glendora, and Irwindale in the month of May. Adults were collected using carbon dioxide baited traps and larvae were monitored using caution strip tapes. Black fly counts were low at all sites, compared to this time the past two years.

VIII. Notes:

The month of May has been busy with training of new "albo crew" staff Jacky Cordova and Freddy Ibarra who this month are venturing out on their own. We also welcomed our new Assistant Vector Ecologist Sam McKeever to the San Gabriel Valley and to California. Sam comes to the District from the University of South Florida and is already proving to be a valuable asset to the District!

Vector Ecologist Kimberly Nelson and Assistant Vector Ecologist Gimena Ruedas have been very active. In addition to their regular duties, they trained our "Volunteer" Ecologist Corey Calaycay, Trustee for the City of Claremont. The two are also busy writing articles for the *Proceedings and Papers of the Mosquito and Vector Control Association of California*. Vector Control Specialist Ignacio Urena and Scientific Program Manager Wakoli Wekesa, are also writing articles for the publication based on the presentations each gave at the annual MVCAC conference held last February.

Outreach Activities

Vince Sanchez, newly minted Education Specialist from North Salinas Valley Mosquito Abatement District, shadowed our Education Specialist for two days, observing several days of classroom presentations and a Vector Inspector Program (VIP) for 7th grade science students at San Jose Charter Academy in West Covina.

One hundred and thirty-six students attended the VIP assembly. The District received 72 property-inspection reports and 62 water samples were submitted. Only four samples were positive for mosquito activity. All larvae submitted were *Culex* species. No invasive mosquito species were found. Participating students received a 5X, folding pocket viewer as a reward for their efforts and a detailed, illustrated report.

The report included not only the presence or absence of mosquitoes, but also indicated the presence of other organisms observed which included everything from unicellular organisms, such as certain types of green algae and paramecium, to larger organisms such as nematode worms and midge larvae. Water that looked relatively clear to the unaided eye could contain an abundance of life. Bdelloid rotifers were the most commonly observed organisms in water samples submitted by students. Their teacher, Mr. Woo, is active on social media and posted pictures of his students comparing their VIP results.

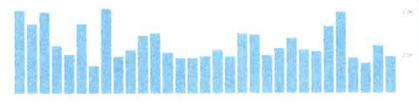

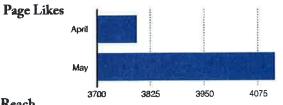

Background

The proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2016-2017 has been approved by the Board's Personnel and Finance Committees. The important components of the proposed budget are discussed below.

If it is approved, the budget will require an assessment for 99 percent of the parcels in the District that increases from \$11.80 for Fiscal Year 2015-2016 to \$11.98 for Fiscal Year 2016-2017.

Personnel Expenses

The line item for non-exempt salaries (6212) shows a considerable surplus which is due to hiring budgeted employees after the beginning of the fiscal year, and one full-time staff who is on an extended leave. We will be fully staffed in Fiscal Year 2017, so this surplus will not occur again.

The Personnel and Finance Committees approved adjusting the salary range of the Office Manager commensurate with the position's responsibilities. The annual impact of an employee who reaches the top step of the salary range is \$4,305.

The Committees also approved funds to hire two extra-help vector control technicians for three months to expand further at a reasonable cost our underground storm drain program. Our preliminary effort has found more than the expected amount of mosquito activity underground; these positions will help us determine our future direction with regard to staffing and our operations.

The Committees approved a 2.4 percent Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) based on the February Federal Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles-Orange-Riverside County area. The impact to the budget is approximately \$55,249.

The proposed budget for personnel expenses for FY 2017 is \$10,647 less than the budget for FY 2016.

Non-Personnel Expenses

6007-Vehicles The proposed budget includes \$31,000 to lease four trucks. When Aedes albopictus arrived, we suspended temporarily our goal of replacing our aging fleet of trucks. It is necessary to replace four vehicles that are over 15 years old and will cost more to keep them operating than they are worth.

6190-Professional Services The \$35,000 increase in this line item includes funds to possibly amend our sphere of influence to include the cities of Baldwin Park and South Pasadena, and to conduct a manager search.

6250- Lab Supplies The amount budgeted for this line item has been increased by \$15,000 for several reasons:

- 1. Since 2011 when *Aedes albopictus* arrived, we have each year spent completely or overspent the amount budgeted for this line item.
- 2. West Nile virus has changed. We have seen high levels of viral activity and human disease each year since 2012. To protect our residents, we must now conduct more surveillance for West Nile virus: The cost and amount of dry ice we use to survey for adult *Culex* has increased, and we have also increased the number of tests we conducted for infections with WNv in mosquitoes and dead birds.
- 3. For FY 2017, we must also test eggs of invasive *Aedes* to see if *Ae. aegypti* is present in the District, and also whether invasive *Aedes* are transmitting chikungunya, dengue, or Zika viruses. Since there is no animal reservoir for these viruses, it is challenging to find infected mosquitoes before they can transmit virus. There is great pressure to prevent locally acquired cases of chikungunya, dengue, and Zika. This will be difficult, because many infections have no symptoms and those infected remain unknown.
- 4. To reduce our impact on the environment and properly manage the population of mosquitoes in the District, we must continuously test them to see if they are resistant to pesticides which are available currently.

Equipment and Supplies to Perform In-House Real Time-Polymerase Chain Reaction (RT-PCR) Tests

Currently we send samples of adult mosquitoes and dead birds to outside agencies so they can be tested for infections with various viruses. We test our chickens for antibodies to St. Louis, West Nile, and western equine encephalomyelitis viruses with a commercially prepared assay.

We are proposing to use \$55,000 from the District's Capital Reserve (currently \$612,923) to purchase the necessary equipment and supplies so staff can conduct PCR tests in house. Below is the projected cost of tests on samples we expect to submit in FY 2017 compared to that if we did them in-house.

As invasive Aedes become endemic and the risk of the diseases they can transmit increases, and if WNv and SLEv continue to increase in prevalence as they have since 2012, the number of tests we conduct will increase. We will also need to test more samples for resistance to pesticides. Being able to conduct tests in-house will also allow us to investigate in greater detail emerging diseases like flea-borne typhus, Lyme disease, and vector-borne roundworms like Dirofilaria immitis and Onchocerca lupi.

The capability to test in-house also will shorten our turnaround for results.

Assessment

The draft budget will increase the basic assessment by \$0.18 to \$11.98 for 99 percent of the District's properties.

Background

Despite being located centrally in our jurisdiction the City of Baldwin Park ("the City") refused to join the District when it was formed in 1989. We have provided vector control to the City by separate contracts in 2002-2003, 2004-2005, 2005-2007, 2008-2009, and 2009-2010. Except for the 2004-2005 contract which was paid for by the County's Department of Public Health, all other agreements contained clauses for the City to conduct a Prop 218 election to join the District, which the City did not honor.

We received this Board's support to work with the City on becoming part of the District after *Aedes albopictus* was discovered in 2011. It has been a lengthy process but their City Council on June 15 will consider a resolution supporting annexation into our District.

Resolution 2016-02 begins the process of petitioning the Los Angeles Local Agency Formation Commission ("LAFCO") to annex the City of Baldwin Park into the District and amend our District's sphere of influence so we can do so.

Manager's Recommendation

Support Resolution 2016-02 contingent on the Baldwin Park City Council's affirmative vote for annexing into our District. If the City does not support annexation, staff will bring back the resolution for the Board to consider proceeding unilaterally.

Alternatives

Do not support Resolution 2016-02

Financial Impact

The cost of amending the sphere of influence and annexing the City into the District is approximately \$10,000, which this Board supported previously

RESOLUTION 2016-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE OF THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY MOSQUITO AND VECTOR CONTROL DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVING AN APPLICATION TO INITIATE PROCEEDINGS TO ANNEX CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE DISTRICT AND TAKING CERTAIN CONNECTED ACTIONS

RECITALS

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the San Gabriel Valley Mosquito and Vector Control District (the "District") proposes to initiate proceedings to annex (the "Proposed Annexation") certain territory (the "Territory") generally described as the area within the boundaries of the City of Baldwin Park (the "City") to the District.

WHEREAS, the Proposed Annexation is being proposed pursuant to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, being Division 3 of Title 5 of the California Government Code (commencing with Section 56000).

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY MOSQUITO AND VECTOR CONTROL DISTRICT HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION1 Pursuant to Section 56654 of the Government Code, the Board hereby finds:

- (i) This proposal is made pursuant to Part 3 of Division 3 of Title 5 of the California Government Code.
- (ii) The nature of this proposal is to make an application by resolution of the Board to initiate proceedings to annex the Territory to the District.
- (iii) The boundaries of the Territory proposed to be annexed to the District are generally described as the boundaries of the City and are more particularly described in a map and a general description, attached here as Exhibit A.
- (iv) The proposed terms and conditions for the Proposed Annexation and Amended Sphere of Influence are that the Territory shall be subject to the payment of such fees, rates, charges, assessments, or taxes as the District may legally impose and that any fees, rates, charges, assessments, or taxes for the District shall be payable in the same manner and at the same time and in the same installments as the general taxes of the District on real property are payable.
- (v) The Proposed Annexation will enable the District to provide services (the "Services") to the City to reduce vector populations and risk of vector borne diseases.

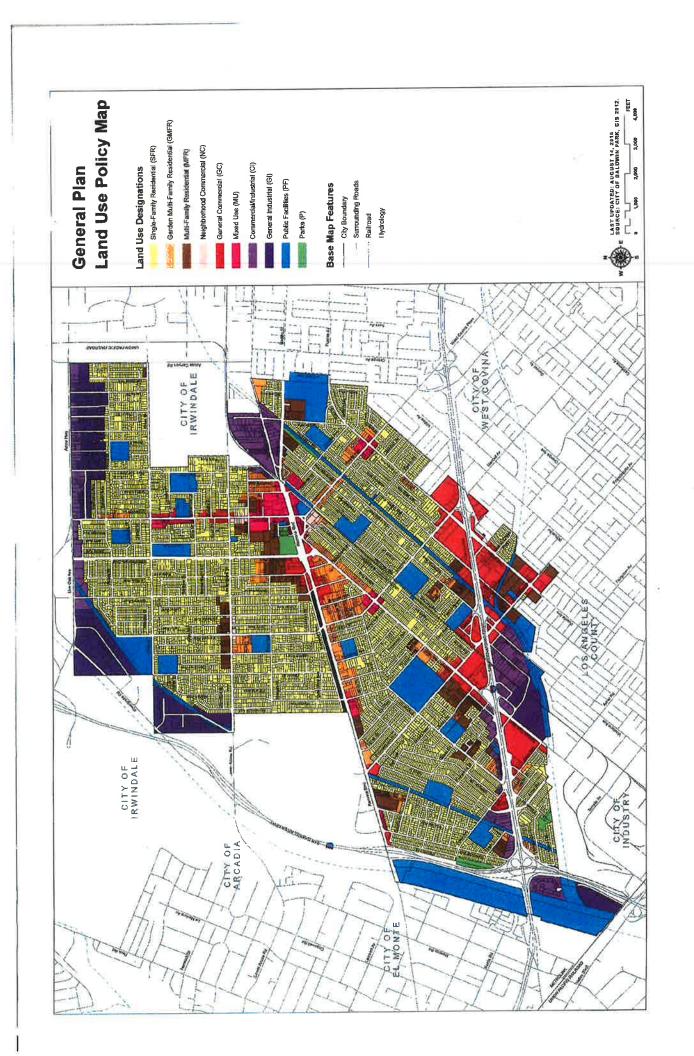
SECTION 3 The Board hereby approves the application to initiate proceedings for the Proposed Annexation and Amended Sphere of Influence in the form on file with the District Secretary, together with changes or additions the District Manager deems necessary or appropriate, and authorizes the District Manager to execute and deliver all necessary documents and instruments and to do all things which the District Manager may deem necessary to implement this Resolution.
